Originally, Anna made button pillows for friends but now she sells them, via word-of-mouth, to other people wanting one of her original creations.



It typically takes three or four hours an evening, over a period of two weeks to make enough yarn buttons to cover a pillow cover.

This conference is a unique opportunity for members of self advocate groups, people with developmental/intellectual disabilities, support staff and family members to meet and network with each other.

Gord, Deborah and Brian were each asked what attending this conference meant to them:

QUESTION: Why is it important to go to conferences like the Speaking Out Conference?

Deborah: You learn a lot of things you didn't know that you can get help with. It's a great experience. I will never forget it.

Gordon: It is very professional, I've been to a number of [conferences] and this one stands out. All the information is very useful and important. It's very positive.

QUESTION: What was your favourite session?

Gordon: That's a hard one! They were all good. I couldn't pick just one.

Deborah: It was all so good, I enjoyed every bit.

QUESTION: What would you tell others who are thinking of going?

Gordon: If you don't go, you'll miss out on a lot of information and many amazing people. And the food is amazing!

The road-trip was a new experience for CLA new-hire, Brian Lachine (Community Support Worker) who is based out of Wawa. He accompanied Deborah and Gordon on the drive to Port Elgin and attended the conference, as well.

Brian: If one word described the experience, it would be POWERFUL. From the moment you arrive through the doors, you sense a powerful unity, a powerful purpose and powerful (yet sensitive) dialogue.

The resonating theme of the weekend was Independence. From independent writing, art and music to independent living, each session left you with a feeling of POWERFUL freedom. Each session also allowed every individual to converse with the key note speakers. Comments and questions were received with applause, hugs and powerful words of encouragement.

As a Community Support Worker in a more remote town (Wawa), I was reminded that my role is exactly that: to support individuals in their journey of independence. What an honour to be a part of this journey and to be part of their powerful stories.































Are you an aspiring writer or artist?
